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PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT: Honouring Our Past — Imagining Our Future

This past year marks the final year of our existence as the CMHA Peterborough Branch. We should be proud of our 62 years of history.

The Canadian Mental Health Association Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge Branch (CMHA HKPR) was launched April 1, 2013, with the amalgamation of its Peterborough and Kawartha Lakes Branches. The amalgamation process started back in April 2011, through an integration process facilitated by the Central East Local Health Integration Network (CE LHIN). The new organization now services the counties of Peterborough, Northumberland, Haliburton, City of Kawartha Lakes and the township of Brock.

Our future is about improving the mental health and well-being for everyone. It is about building and maintaining effective community partnerships and truly meeting the needs of people of all ages living with mental illness and their families.

The following is a summary of activities and initiatives undertaken in 2012/2013 fiscal year. The Branch continues to demonstrate exceptional work, strong leadership and dedication to continually improve mental health services in our community.

- ➢ In May 2012, we launched our "Stop The Stigma" campaign during Mental Health Week in partnership with local business, BrandHealth.
- We were successful through the City of Peterborough RFP submission for the operation of a Community Drop-In-Centre. The Centre is named "The Lighthouse" and is located at St. John's Centre. The centre is open five days per week and one day at Murray Street Baptist Church
- ➤ We held our 7th Annual Golf Tournament at the Quarry in Ennismore.
- Our Local Human Service and Justice Committees in Haliburton, City of Kawartha Lakes, Peterborough and Northumberland received \$7000 each annually from the CE LHIN to support local human service and justice activities.
- The City and County of Peterborough were selected as one of the first nineteen Ministry of Health "Health Links". The Health Links Model will focus on improving patient care and outcomes for the high user population cohorts through enhanced local integration among health care providers, while delivering better value for investment. CMHA Peterborough is at the table focusing on the Mental Health and Addictions cohorts.
- ➤ In late January 2013, the branch created a Fund Development position to assist the Board with fundraising initiatives.

- ➤ The Board approved the purchase of 415-421 Water Street (formerly the site of Howell Fleming Law Firm) a 14,000 sq. ft., three floor building. The back office functions (Human Resources, Finance, and Administration) moved over in early February 2013. Future programs that will relocate here are the OTN Clinic, Early Psychosis Lynx Team, Supportive Housing, Health Promotion, and the Fund Development Team.
- ➤ The Human Resources and Skills Development Canada Office for Disability Issues provided the branch with \$50,000 through the Enabling Accessibility Fund in order to install a lift and accessible washroom facilities at 415 Water Street.
- Catering Plus undertook a full review of its current operations to determine the viability of a social enterprise within a competitive market and recommend improvements that will increase efficiencies, reduce costs and enhance quality.
- ➤ We hosted our 17th Annual Paul's Dirty Enduro event in the Ganaraska Forest on September 15th, 2012.
- With the amalgamation, the new organization has begun working toward developing a new strategic plan. The plan will be launched in June 2013.
- The Branch received an additional \$11,800 in one-time funding for replacement reserve costs associated with the Supportive Housing Program.
- The Central East LHIN assisted with one time funding to cover integration costs. This included redundancy costs, legal costs for incorporation, workstations, computer purchases and telephone replacement.
- We have commenced work in preparation for the Accreditation Survey in May 2014.

Mental Health Case Management

The program provides community-based case management services to adults living with a serious mental illness, utilizing best practices and evidence based outcomes. Program staff provide services within a multidisciplinary team approach. Consumers receive services that will allow them to increase their ability to live quality lives and develop their own support system. Clients post-discharge are monitored for 12 months to ensure continued stability.

The CMHA Trustee Program is a voluntary program available for clients that have a CMHA Case Manager and we assist clients in budgeting, paying bills, maintaining housing, advocating with creditors, decreasing debts and developing savings, while ensuring that the client's needs are met.

Dual Diagnosis Case Management Program Staff: 13

The team supports adults living with a dual diagnosis (intellectual disability and mental health issues) through a Supported Independent Living (SIL) Program. Case Managers assist clients in recovery using the Ontario Common Assessment of Need (OCAN) tool. Along with assessment, Case Managers provide client centred support service that promote stabilization and independent living as mandated by the Ministry of Community and Social Services. The Case Manager carries out these duties as a member of a multi-disciplinary team within CMHA HKPR. Individual progress is a result of collaboration with psychiatrists, family members, community partners, psychoeducational opportunities, crisis intervention and addiction supports. The Dual Diagnosis Program develops and monitors measureable outcomes to ensure continuous quality improvement.

Four County Crisis (4CC)

The program provides a comprehensive range of crisis services to individuals aged 16 years and over in the Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge region. Services include: 24/7 crisis telephone support, crisis support outreach in the community, shortterm case management supports for individuals who have more complex issues and circumstances, the Integrated Outreach Program with the Peterborough Lakefield Police and the Hospital 2 Home Program with Peterborough Regional Health Center and the Ross Memorial Hospital in the City of Kawartha Lakes. 4CC also incorporates the Specialized Network of Care that provides case management and systems advocating for individuals with a developmental disability and mental health issues and/or involved or at risk of being involved with the criminal justice system.

Consumer Initiatives and Vocational Services

This is evidenced through the program development and restructures that have occurred in all supports and services within the team. We have established unique and effective programs that successfully support a diverse client base. We value client citizenship and have imbedded programs that build strong connections in our community and with our stakeholders. The foundation of our work is a strength based approach to build on clients existing strengths and knowledge through programs and services that will enhance their quality of life.

Lighthouse Community Centre

The Lighthouse Community Centre provides a minimum-barrier environment for those individuals living in poverty to come for nourishment, social interaction and support. The Lighthouse Community Centre is open Monday - Friday from 11-4 at St. Johns Anglican Church and on Sundays from 1-4 at Murray Street Baptist Church.

Homelessness Partnering Strategy (HPS)

This is a federally funded program that provides accessible, client-centred outreach and integrated case management support to high need individuals who are homeless or at-risk of homelessness. The Outreach Workers will help people to obtain and maintain housing and the voluntary trustee program can assist with money management support. Outreach Workers and Trustee Workers also link individuals to necessary community resources (e.g. income, mental health, addictions, employment, and education support).

The HPS/HCRT (Homelessness Coordinated Response Team) Trustee is a voluntary financial management program that assists clients with budgeting, paying bills, regulating spending, creating savings and ultimately maintaining housing to prevent homelessness.

Telemedicine Program

The Ontario Telemedicine Network (OTN) Program started in 2012 and provides support to all people of all ages with various types of health concerns living in the HKPR region. A Registered Nurse is available to assist the physician as requested and make recommendations to other programs and agencies in the community. We have assisted with appointments to Princess Margaret Hospital, Sick Children's Hospital, the Movement Disorder Clinic for Parkinson's Disease, as well as dermatology and mental health referrals. Mental health is impacted by many health conditions and links have been made to other programs to support clients. We have had many positive comments as it decreases the stress of travelling to Toronto, wait times for appointments, time away from work and the financial burden of the trip. We are fully accessible and parking is outside the door. During the fiscal year 529 patients used the OTN Clinic and 15 patients used the Telederm Program accessing a dermatologist using a special camera.

Supportive Housing

Staff: 8

CMHA HKPR owns, refers and/or manages 223 units for people with serious mental illness, addictions and/or dual diagnosis in Peterborough, Kawartha Lakes and Northumberland. There are an additional 50+ units that are dedicated to CMHA clients through community partnerships. These units are in a variety of settings that include care homes and one or two bedroom units. Supports for clients in these units are based on client need and may include housing supports, housing retention, peer supports and case management. Supports are also provided to some clients in partnership with other community agencies, including the Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) Team and the Four County Addictions

Lynx provides outreach, assessment and treatment services for people aged 14 to 35 in the early stages of psychosis, and their families.


